First World War.
Head Sister Constance
Keys RRC (AANS) who
was one of the four
Queensland nurses to sail
with the first convoy of
ships bound for Egypt in
Sep 1914. She served in
Egypt and France and
was awarded the Royal
Red Cross, First Class
and Medaille des Epidemies. She did not return
to Australia until 1 Nov
1919.

World War Two. Captain Pearl Mittelheuser (AANS) who died as a Prisoner of War of the Japanese: also depicted is the sinking of SS Vyner Brook 12Feb1942 only two survived. Sister Vivian Bullwinkel (AANS) was the sole surviving nurse together with a British soldier who later died of wounds. 64 Australian nurses were among the 181 passengers and 47 crew who embarked from Singapore.

Asian Wars—Vietnam.
Flight Officer Rosslyn
Richards (RAAFNS)
who was a MEDIVAC
nurse caring for wounded on aircraft transporting them out of Vietnam; Rosslyn also deployed on Operation
Baby Lift in April 1975
immediately prior to the
fall of
Saigon.





Peacekeeping Operations—Rwanda. Lieutenant Alexandra Logan (RAANC) was part of **United Nations Assis**tance Mission for Rwanda in which Australia provided a large specialist medical contingent that including nurses from all three services that supported the whole UN mission and provided much needed nursing and medical assistance to the local Rwandan community. Australians have been serving as Peacekeepers somewhere in the world every year since 1947 to current day

#### **Opening Address—Jenny Waldron**

Distinguished Guests, Nurses, fellow Veterans, Ladies and Gentlemen, this morning in the hours before the country pauses to remember all who died and suffered in the service of our country, the Bundaberg & District Ex Servicewomen's Association is honoured to once again be here at War Nurses Memorial Park to remember the sacrifice and service of our war nurses and to commemorate the Centenary of The Armistice with the official unveiling of the Australian War Nurses Centenary of Armistice Mural.

The mural was commissioned by our Association and we were assisted by technical experts from the Bundaberg Regional Council, Bundaberg Quick Signs and of course the creative talents of local artist Ross Driver. And of course the nurses who shared their photos and stories for the mural. We also acknowledge the funding assistance provided by Department of Veterans' Affairs Centenary of Armistice Grant program - Hinkler Electorate that enabled our Association to undertake this community project; that we hope will provide a lasting tribute to all War Nurses and is a fitting way to commemorate the Centenary of Armistice.

Panel 5 of the Australian War Nurses Centenary of Armistice Mural shows Major Patrick Bates, RAANC at work in Afghanistan. Unfortunately, we received the following from Patrick too late to include in the program or in our official signage. I would like to read his words now:

Tarin Kowt 2009 seems like a lifetime ago.

The complexity of the mission in Afghanistan was matched by the traumatic injuries sustained by Australian and Coalition forces as well as the local civilians who were treated at the Role 2 health Facility in Tarin Kowt.

"TK" was a hustling Coalition base that acted as the hub for operations.

Operations that involved Australian soldiers risking their lives and being exposed to both physical and mental dangers that many have seen and heard in the past. For several months this was my life.

Treating the wounded, seriously disfigured by IED's or other kinetic weapons.

Looking after the sick who would often struggle on through not wanting to let down their mates.

And providing the two Australian soldiers that were killed with dignity and ensuring that they were returned home for their final farewell.

Serving as a nurse in the Army has been an honour whilst now being part of the legacy associated with serving on operations as an Australian Army Nurse will always be a privilege that I will cherish.

The words of Major Bates could just as easily have been attributed to a nurse from the First World War – it is just the technology that has changed over the century.

Although the guns fell silent today 100 years ago, which led to the eventual end of the First World War in June 2019 with the Signing of the Treaty of Versailles, the battle to help thousands of damaged and ill veterans continued for years. This work was done by mothers, fathers, husbands, wives, families and friends and communities; and of course by both military and civilian nurses and other medical experts in our hospitals. It has been thus after every war, conflict or operation, and this vital nursing and supportive care continues throughout Australia today, with veterans from Second World War through to Current Day conflicts.



#### Mural elaborations—Leone Wilson OAM

Ross Driver was not able to join us today as he is in Gayndah to judge RSL paintings and exhibit paintings portraying hardships and heroes from the 1<sup>st</sup> Australian Infantry Battalion. Ross sends his apologies.

The mural you see before you is made up of watercolours created by Ross Driver. I had the opportunity to watch as Ross meticulously add a blush of colour to the poppies that appear on panel 6. The painting was around A3 in size and the brush one of the finest I have seen. As he added a touch of red, he commented "I worry that I do justice to our service men and women". Ross gifted countless hours to this project; I have no doubt that every brush stroke has been laid with reverence.

Converting the six paintings onto the large skin and installing that onto the tank was a task which fell to Brett Sauer of Bundy Quick Signs. Once more I had the opportunity to watch the work being done by Brett as he added the wording and poppies to the computer image. Brett's skill and pride in what he was doing was obvious and this too has become part of what we see today.

Special mention must be made of Rosslyn Richards, Alexandra Logan and Patrick Bates who agreed to our request to be featured on the panels, Vietnam through to Middle East.

Also, Jenny Waldron who appears on the Peace painting. For Jenny to be included is very fitting as the mural and so much of what you see in this War Nurses Memorial Park can be attributed to Jenny's vision and determination.
