




Leone Wilson thanked the many who contributed stories and the team of editorial readers plus compiler of Vol 1, Jenny for their assistance in making the second book possible.

The members of Bundaberg District Women Veterans welcome our



The 2022 Emerald Reunion Service was much more than a commemoration of the contribution of women in the ADF. The service marked anniversaries that should never be forgotten by our nation—it also saw the dedication of plaques that are now a permanent reminder to the Bundaberg community of the service and sacrifices of Australians and that of the region's nurses. It was a special day.



War Nurses Memorial Park is situated on the corner of Bundaberg's main road from the south, Takalvan Street/ Isis Highway and the city's central main street, Bourbong Street. It is over the road from the Bundaberg Hospital and the War Nurses Memorial Pavilion, the first ever Australian War Memorial dedicated to nurses, dates back to 1949. It was listed on the Queensland Heritage Register in 1992.

In 2014 our Association marked the Anzac Centenary by completing a government grants, community and association funded redevelopment of the surrounding area, in-

cluding construction of a memorial wall to facilitate services.

The very successful project has been further enhanced by the addition of more commemorative plaques, a set of story boards recording the history of service nursing, a mural and associated signage. All additional plaques have been dedicated at commemorative services. The memorial is used whenever special anniversaries are remembered and is the site of an annual Anzac Day service which our association conducts.

On 17 July 2022, further plaques were added in recognition of nurses serving in the Vietnam War and Peace Operations. Two anniversaries were recognised and commemorated the service and sacrifice of Australians in Vietnam and on Peace Operations was commemorated.

The commemoration also paid tribute to those who served in the women's services and the organisations that foster their ongoing friendships by commencing the day's event with a parade of banners.

The parade was under the command of our commemorations officer, Angella Hillis CSC and was led by Piper Adam Johnston of the Bundaberg Caledonian Pipe Band.



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Lisa Taylor and Sonya Leijen carried the banner which had been given to our care by Woodgate RSL; they were followed by our members Lynne Pollock and Kay Littler with our association banner. We are thankful to our visitors who brought their association banners to Bundaberg for this parade.



The service commenced with a welcome and introduction by the MC, association president, Jennifer Waldron:

Distinguished guests, fellow veterans, nurses, ladies and gentlemen- on behalf of Bundaberg District Women Veterans it is my privilege to welcome you all to War Nurses Memorial Park, believed to be the first war memorial in Australia solely dedicated to nurses. It was built by the community from donations and was dedicated in 1949.

The Heritage Listed Memorial Pavilion is used every day by nurses, staff, and visitors to the Base Hospital – and I am sure the nurses it honours would be very happy to know it is well used.

In 2014 our association undertook a major enhancement project as part of the Anzac Century commemorations that included the new Service Nurse Memorial Wall, the new gardens and trees and the storyboards.

Our Service of Remembrance this morning, commemorates the 60th Anniversary of deployment of Australian troops to the Vietnam War and 75 Years of Australian Peace Operations involving peacemaking, peacekeeping and humanitarian missions and we especially welcome



our Vietnam veterans and those who have served on the many peace operations throughout the world over the last 7 decades.

This morning we also welcome visiting women veterans of all eras who are in Bundaberg to celebrate our Association's 55th Anniversary and we also remember those women who paid the supreme sacrifice and all who have served our country both at home and aboard.


A Prayer For Nurses Who Paid The Supreme Sacrifice

The 75th Anniversary of Australian Peace Operations commemorative address was delivered by Federal Member for Hinkler, Keith Pitt MP.

<u>75th Anniversary of Australian Peace Operations</u> <u>Bundaberg War Nurses Memorial – Sunday, 17 July 2022</u>

For the past 75 years Australians have served on peacekeeping operations providing stability, commitment and passion, in what are complex and dangerous situations.

Since the first peacekeeping operation in 1947 in Netherlands East Indies – what we know as Indonesia today – more than 30,000 Australians have delivered humanitarian aid to countries around the globe.

They have worked in more than 70 peace and security operations including Afghanistan, Cyprus, Iran, Yugoslavia, Zimbabwe and closer to home East Timor and the Solomon Islands.

Our peacekeepers come from all walks of life. Some are from the Australian Defence Force, others are state or federal police workers, public servants, aid workers, scientists or other specialists, and many civilians have also served.

Their duties are just as varied as their backgrounds, but can include:

- military observers to monitor ceasefire violation
- supporting democratic elections
- treating casualties
- landmine clearance operations and teaching locals to do it
- providing communications, medical and movement control team
- policing support functions; and

• helping to deliver or make possible humanitarian aid.

Some peacekeeping missions have only involved a handful of personnel. But since the 1970s, Australia's contributions have increased in size and scope.

In the 1970s and 80s RAAF helicopters operated in the Sinai, as Egypt and Israel ended three decades of hostilities.

At the end of the 1970s, an Australian infantry force of 150 soldiers took part in a British Commonwealth operation as Zimbabwe won its independence.

A decade later an even larger contingent, composed largely of engineers, assisted a UN operation with a similar role in Namibia.

The 1990s were the busiest decade in the history of multinational peacekeeping with Australian peacekeepers in Cambodia, Somalia and Rwanda, the Middle East, Cyprus, Iraq, Bougainville and East Timor during this time.

Australia organised and led International Force East Timor contributing over 5,500 personnel and the force commander, former Governor General, Sir Peter Cosgrove.

One of the Australian Navy vessels to take cargo and troops to East Timor was HMAS Tobruk – which as many of you would know now rests approximately 22 nautical miles from Burnett Heads as a military dive wreck.

HMAS Tobruk had more than 34 years of decorated service with its ability to carry 18 tanks, more than 40 Armoured Personnel Carriers or Light Armoured Vehicles on the vehicle deck, 520 personnel, and with two helicopter decks, it provided logistical support for multiple peacekeeping and humanitarian missions.

As well as East Timor, HMAS Tobruk served at missions in Sinai, Somalia, the Middle East, Bougainville, the Solomon Islands, Papua New Guinea and assisted Tonga and Vanuatu with food and building equipment after they were hit by cyclones in the 1980s, and Samoa and Tonga which were devastated by tsunami in 2009.

The role of women in military service and civilian peacekeeping operations has grown over the years and today, more women serve in leadership positions in UN peacekeeping than ever before.

Women serve Australia and the UN as military personnel, police officers and civilians in a variety of roles.

Now retired, former Major General Cheryl Pearce recently completed her tenure as Force Commander, United Nations Forces in Cyprus and was awarded the Conspicuous Service Cross for her outstanding achievement whilst appointed to the position during the period January 2019 to January 2021.

Female peacekeepers have played a vital role in interviewing and supporting women and girls who are survivors of violence and in some cases, female peacekeepers can engage better with female civilians for cultural or religious reasons.

Members of the Bundaberg District Women Veterans have served in peacekeeping and peacemaking missions including Sinai, Somalia, Rwanda, Bougainville, East Timor and Sudan.

I extend my thanks to those members for their role in helping restore stability and assistance to those nations and their people.

Sadly, 16 Australians have lost their lives during peacekeeping missions and today we pay tribute to them and say thank you to all Australians who have served during peacekeeping operations.

Thank you for your service.

<u>60th Anniversary of Australia's Commitment to Vietnam</u> <u>Commemorative Address: War Nurses of the Vietnam Era</u>

Sixty years ago, Australia committed itself to the then ever developing conflict in Vietnam. What began as an initial response of thirty military advisors to support theGovernment of South Vietnam, grew to a commitment of service of almost sixtythousand Australians.

The conflict in Vietnam was a war fought like no other, and the arrival home, an experience like no other Australian involved conflict.

Between 1967 and 1971, one-hundred and fifty military nurses and two- hundred volunteer civilian nurses served in South Vietnam.

Conditions were often extreme and tasks before those nurses were demanding. The wounds inflicted upon the servicemen on the battlefield did not simplyremain on the battlefield.



Australia's brave nurses confronted the horrors of war, often brought to the hospital grounds by the swift work of the 'Dust-off' helicopters.

Confronted with the traumatic amputations caused by the explosions of mines, nurses met the often form of injury with the same dedication, commitment, and care as they did the wounds from gunshots and shrapnel as well.

Intensive care nurses regularly undertook, at minimum, six 12-hour shifts a week. Indeed, during the 1968 Tet Offensive nurses were at their post for fourteen nights straight.

In her contribution to the Australian War Memorial, Captain Jane Naughton stated:

"When battle casualties occurred, we would receive a radio message warning us of incoming casualties. The hospital was brought to ALERT by a shrill blast of a siren."

Lieutenant Colleen Mealy spoke of how the casualties would come at either dawn or dusk. Colleen reflects on how the wounded would have their rifles taken from them, unless already being used as a splint, strapped to their leg. In her words on the wounded,

"When they would come in and they would see an Aussie nurse there, they would have a smile on their face."

For nurses serving in the Air Force, at the RAAF base at Butterworth in Malaya, aero-medical evacuations were an extra element of danger and duty.

Whilst the fighting was still as fierce, the survival rate of casualties havingreached hospital increased dramatically when compared to World War II. Eight and half percent of casualties died after reaching hospital in World War II, Vietnam the figure was less than three percent.

From aero-medivac operations to the hospital grounds, Australian nurses saved lives in the name of duty, commitment, care, honour, and service to their country. Their legacy will live long as we all strive to remember their service some near sixty years on.

Lest We Forget.

Following the official addresses, each new plaque was 'unveiled' by them being introduced. The introduction was a reading of the plaques commemorative content.

The dedication was followed by Wreath Laying during which time Piper Adam Johnston played a Lament.

The gathering was invited to a tree planting ceremony which would be held in the same park as soon as chairs and equipment were moved.

The transition from the War Nurses Memorial Pavillion and Australian Service Nurses Memorial Wall area to a site in the War Nurses Memorial Park that had been selected by council, was carried out by a workforce made up of members, visitors and guests; chairs, lectern, table, sound equipment were all rearranged, joining signage and portraits of the Queen, flags and bunting.





Following completion of the 30 minute exercise the MC, who was still president Jennifer Waldron, commenced the ceremonial event:

Distinguished Guests, Ladies and Gentlemen, on behalf of Bundaberg District Women Veterans it is my honour to welcome you to the Commemorative Tree Planting Ceremony to commemorate the Platinum Jubilee of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

The gathering were asked to stand for the playing of the Royal Anthem of Australia.



Jennifer continued:

Our 'jubilee trees for war memorial parks' project will create an enduring, living legacy that will honour the Queens 70 years of service to Australia and the Commonwealth. Given The Queen's service during WWII and her role as Colonel in Chief of the Royal Australian Army Nursing Corps, it is fitting that the two parks for our project are at Lions Remembrance Park, home of many WWII memorials and here at War Nurses Memorial Park.

We didn't have much time to submit a project, but we had a 'dream' just waiting for an opportunity; and so with the help from the parks staff at Bundaberg Regional Council – a fully designed plan was whipped into shape in a matter of days. The completed project will be a dream come true for our group of proud women veterans, ensuring our treasured war memorial parks are presented in a fitting manner to the community, and reflecting their high esteem for our war nurses and the men and women who have served Australia.

War Nurses Memorial Park will see 23 trees planted to partner the trees planted at the memorial end of the park in 2014. Both sides of the southern section of the park will be planted with Blueberry Ash Prima Donna – the same pink flowering tree that frames the memorial section. Here at the playground and picnic area – two Weeping Lilly Pillys will be planted and at the centre of the access road – in place of the palms will be planted a Signature Tree – with the rather plain common name of Bumpy Ash.

At Lions Remembrance Park 10 trees will be planted, providing a parade of Hard and Eumundi Quandong trees to complement the war memorials that reside in the park, with the feature tree at this park being a Moreton Bay Fig; with a tree planting event to take place at Lions Remembrance Park on 11 November to mark the completion of the project. Permanent commemorative signage will be installed at both parks once the project has been completed.

Bundaberg District Women Veterans are honoured on behalf of all servicewomen and servicemen of the Bundaberg region to participate in the nation-wide tree planting program, and have distinct pride in delivering a lasting commemorative legacy of The Queen's Platinum Jubilee for the community of Bundaberg.

Jennifer than invited Keith Pitt MP, Federal Member for Hinkler to say a few words. Keith began by recognising those present and a general thank you for attending, plus a thanks to Jennifer. He went on to say:

The Planting Trees for the Queen's Jubilee Program commemorates Her Majesty, The Queen's 70 years of service to the Commonwealth and Australia which is a significant milestone.

tralia which is a significant milestone. The Queen holds the record of the longest reign of a British monarch and is the second-longest reigning monarch in history behind French King Louis XIV (14th) who reigned for 72 years and 110 days.

For many of us here today, The Queen is the only monarch we have known.

Before becoming Queen, she served with the Auxiliary Territorial Service (ATS), the women's branch of the British Army, during the Second World War – joining when she turned 18 and training as a mechanic. She was also the first female of the Royal family to be an active duty member of the British Armed Forces.

Although there isn't an official count, the Queen is believed to have planted more than 1600 trees throughout her 70 years. The Queen has visited Australia 16 times and on many of these visits has planted trees at community events and ceremonies, so this program is a fitting way to commemorate the Jubilee.

Not only will projects like today's create a long-lasting legacy it will serves to honour the memory of the Queen and her service.



A similar tree planting program has been undertaken in the United Kingdom and there is an interactive map you can see where all the tree plantings are located. Australia will have its own interactive map where this event today will be available to see – along with all tree planting events held around the country. Other local projects will include plantings at Bundaberg Christian College and Bundaberg South State School.

Finally I want to share with you a quote by Nelson Henderson which I think it particularly fitting for today:

"The true meaning of life is to plant trees, under whose shade you do not expect to sit."

I hope all of the trees planted in honour of the Queen's Jubilee will flourish to provide shade for our future generations and leave a legacy as important as she has.

Mr Pitt then sought our indulgence as he repeated the Oath that he has made:

I, Keith John Pitt, do swear that I will well and truly serve the people of Australia and that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, Queen of Australia. So help me God!

Jennifer introduced the ceremonial tree planting, inviting Keith Pitt MP, Bill Trevor OAM and patron of Bundaberg District Women Veterans, Leone Wilson OAM to plant the first tree—a *Watershousia Floribunda* (*Weeping Lily Pilly*)





Major Melissa Millard, Bundaberg Salvation Army provided a Blessing:

Creator of life and sustainer of seed and soil, of tree and flower, you have created this world and all that lives in it. It is to you that we come in this prayer of dedication and blessing, for you are the giver of life and the sustainer of all that lives. We come to you to dedicate this tree in celebration of the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. We ask that you continue to hold her in your generous grace. We give you thanks for her life and leadership. May this tree, and those that will be planted in her honour, remind us of the Queen and her quest for peace throughout the Commonwealth. May this tree be strong to bear witness to your abundant love and grace. We ask for your blessing upon this tree, that life might dwell and bear witness to our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we pray. Amen. The Australian National Anthem followed.


